CHILD SAFEGUARDING IN SENIOR CLUBS - Q

- How will this work in senior clubs?
- We are a football / netball club in a small country league that does not have a junior football competition (boys or girls), however we do have junior netball teams, and multiple kids involved in boundary umpiring/ water boys and girls etc. I assume that we'll still be able to follow the guidelines (policy templates etc) presented in these education sessions?

SHARING & DISTRIBUTING INFORMATION - A

- Evidence and consultation tells us we need to communicate through a number of channels and methods (NUDGE!)

- We need to continue to share the messages on a rotation / not just once



WORKING WITH OTHER CHILD SAFETY AGENCIES - Q

CHILD SAFE OFFICERS / SAFEGUARDING LEAD - Q

- The role of CSO and strategies for driving compliance.
- Child Safe Officer v Safeguarding Lead Can you please clarify
 these roles? Are clubs mandated to have an official Child Safe
 Officer? I understood the Safeguarding Lead was the person who
 would roll out initiatives around child safeguarding, not necessarily
 an official appointment. Are these roles different?



CHILD SAFE OFFICERS / SAFEGUARDING LEAD - A

- Not different, essentially the same thing.
- CSO is there to drive preventative activities / undertake actions for compliance and respond to issues
- If you have a CSO, make them the Safeguarding Lead.
- If you don't, make someone the SL as an interim until you app a
 CSO
- Yes, mandated to have a CSO (?)
- Safeguarding portfolio at board level too



MOVING FROM CURRENT TO NEW - Q

MOVING FROM CURRENT TO NEW - A

Priorities for shifting from current to new:

- Cultural Safety you can focus on a/b/c
- Involving families use families resources
- Continuous improvement make sure it is standing agenda item
- Use inclusive clubs and people and culture resources

WORKING WITH CHILDREN CHECKS-Q

Can there please some more information regarding WWCC requirements and who needs them.

Nearly everyone in the club volunteers in some capacity including players i.e. rosters for canteen, gate, etc.

What is the minimum requirement in relation to WWCC? Coaches of teams that have people 18 and under? Any others.

Any information around this would be great.



WORKING WITH CHILDREN CHECKS-A

State or territory dependent

People & Culture Resource (see image)

Ignore exemptions if you can (police, teachers)

(2) DO THE BACKGROUND CHECKS

Working with Children Checks (WWCC), or State/Territory equivalent, and National Police Check.

Any adult in a paid or volunteer role in your club, league or association should have a WWCC and have it linked to your club, league, association. It is an important part of creating a culture of safety.

This includes:

- committee members
- coaches and managers (including seniors)
- club medical support (physios, trainers etc)
- position holders (junior coordinators, officials, volunteers)
- · any supervising adult on overnight trips.

Clubs, leagues and associations should sight the Working with Children Check card, or state/territory equivalent, and keep a record of who has them.

There are some situations where adults may be exempt from holding a WWCC under state/territory legislation e.g. Police Officer or Teacher. You should still ask them to get one, if they can. This is a different role and we shouldn't make assumptions of people based on their profession.

Regularly run the identification details through the appropriate state/territory checking system. Quarterly is a good idea, but annually as a minimum.

It is best practice for clubs to conduct police checks on those in their club that have regular contact with children and young people ie. Coaches, assistant coaches, and team managers.
